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You should establish clear expectations about how you will communicate, including what channels you will use and how frequently.

Ensure that you don't leave your mentee's messages unanswered for extended periods and, if you have committed to a call or a meeting, you should be on time. If you have said you will do something, do it. Your mentee owes you the same respect: lead by example.

RELIABLE

Mentoring is often a flexible commitment, but you must be consistent and respectful of one another.



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If you're unsure or uncomfortable about answering your mentee's questions, you should signpost them to another contact who will be better able to provide an answer. Guessing or even pretending to know after you've researched the topic helps nobody!

Your mentee may come to you to discuss their ideas. This is because they want your perspective. The best way you can help is to be honest: constructively challenge them, discussing positives and negatives together with alternative options.

HONEST

Being a mentor doesn't mean you know everything, and being supportive doesn't mean always agreeing.
